Program Details

Placement exams are available for those who have taken Hebrew and/or Greek at another educational institution. Placement exams are intended to determine a student's language skill and establish the appropriate course level for their demonstrated ability. The student's grade on the exam will be used to decide his/her level of entry into the language program(s). Please speak to the Director of Administration for more details about taking one of these exams. A failing grade requires entry into Greek 1 or Hebrew 1.

Exegetical courses require demonstrated competency in Greek and Hebrew; Systematic Theology courses should be completed in sequence.

Students may request taking an Exegetical Studies or Systematic Theology course out of sequence. This request must be submitted in writing to the Academic Dean.

Please speak to the Director of Administration to inquire about transferring classes from another institution.

Certificate Program of Reformed Baptist Studies

The Certificate in Reformed Baptist Studies program is a 16-hour program designed to supplement previous ministerial studies. This program is intended for continuing education of Pastors and theological students to gain understanding of Historical Reformed Baptist Doctrine.

Certificate Courses

PT 500 Theology of Ministry, 2 units AP 501 Intro to Philosophical Theology, 2 units ST501 Symbolics I, 2 units ST502 Symbolics II, 2 units CH701 Modern Church (Baptist History), 4 units = 12 units

Special/Visiting Student (For Credit)

The Special/Visiting Student program is designed for students who do not intend to pursue a degree but would like to take courses for credit. Students may take up to 20 credits in this program. With the approval of the Academic Dean a student who meets all other admissions criteria may transfer into one of our degree programs. The Special/Visiting Student program is not intended to serve as preparation for Gospel ministry.

Diploma Program (No Credit Diploma)

The Diploma program is a 110-hour non-degree program designed to be completed residentially in a minimum of 3 years. Exegetical, Systematic, Historical, Practical and Language courses are emphasized. This non-degree program is intended to provide students an opportunity to study at IRBS Theological Seminary who have not yet earned an accredited Bachelor's degree. Students who are accepted into this program will pay the standard tuition rate and fees and participate in class as any other student would, with regard to assignments and examinations. This program is not a degree granting program but a diploma will be conferred to the student upon completion of the program. Credits will not be transferred to other institutions.

Auditing

Those desiring to audit will be required to complete our registration and consent form. Expectations for auditors conduct in class are set forward in the consent form.

Course Descriptions by Department

Apologetics

AP501 Intro to Philosophical Theology

2 UNITS Introduction to Philosophical Theology will examine the relationship between faith and reason and between theology and philosophy. Students will be introduced to the metaphysical and epistemological principles that have shaped the theological grammar of Christian orthodoxy and that continue to have abiding value for the defense of the Christian faith today.

AP601 Challenges to the Faith

2 UNITS A consideration of the major challenges to the Christian Faith such as Romanism, Islam, Mormonism etc.

AP701 Apologetics in Pastoral Ministry

3 UNITS A practical examination of issues pastors may face in their churches such as pluralism, ethical issues arising from cultural changes, answers to scientific objections, and responses to militant atheism.

Biblical Studies/Biblical Theology

BS501 Hermeneutics

3 UNITS This foundational study treats principles of Reformed hermeneutics, history of hermeneutics, sources of hermeneutical principles, canonical structure and hermeneutics, biblical genres and hermeneutics, the Bible's interpretation of the Bible, biblical theology and hermeneutics, typology, and some contemporary issues.

BT601 Biblical Theology I

MR. BARCELLOS 2 UNITS Through this study the student is introduced to the discipline of biblical theology, covering its place and function in the encyclopedia of theology, a brief history, a working definition, various models and practitioners, and hermeneutics and biblical theology. It also provides a brief overview of redemptive history from creation to consummation, focusing on the progressive, organic, Christ-centered unfolding of Special Revelation in light of the entire canon of Scripture. The course concludes with examples of biblical-theological exegesis with the goal of preaching.

BT602 Biblical Theology II

MR. BARCELLOS 2 UNITS This course reviews and continues the study of the discipline of biblical theology. It includes a working definition of biblical theology and hermeneutics and biblical theology. It treats in some detail the foundations of a biblical theology of the Bible.

Church History

CH601 Ancient Church/Patristics

3 UNITS Church History 601 is a study of the Ancient Church, also referred to as the period of the Patristics, or Church Fathers, following the Apostolic age. Here the student will cover roughly the historical period from the close of the 1st century to the close of the 6th century. In the course, through interaction with both primary and secondary material, the student will learn of the doctrine and life of the church in this crucial period of her early formation.

CH602 Medieval Christianity

2 UNITS Church History 602 is designed to pick up at the close of CH 601 with the advent of the Medieval Period of Church History. This course will broadly cover the years from the beginnings of the 6th century to the emergence of the Renaissance just prior to the time of the Reformation. Here the student will develop a working knowledge of an oft forgotten period in the history of Christ's church through engagement of material from both primary and secondary sources in an examination of key writers and points of theological development and corruption during these important years in the history of the church.

CH603 Reformation

2 UNITS Church History 603 is designed to continue the narrative of the history of the church left off in CH602. Here the student will be taken from the dawn of the Reformation through the period of the 16th century itself as the

Reformation spread from the continent of Europe to the lands of England in the north. Again, the student will, in the study of this period, be presented and engage with both primary and secondary sources to gain an understanding and appreciation for these glorious, and at times troublesome, years in the history of Christ's church.

CH610 Puritanism

2 UNITS An introduction to Puritanism in contexts of the ecclesiastical and civil struggles of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, and the place of the movement in the church's theological development.

CH701 Modern Church (Baptist History)

4 UNITS A survey of modern developments and personalities in church history, and of various Baptist groups from the time of the Reformation to the present. Special attention is given to the rise of the modern Reformed Baptist movement.

Language Studies

LS-G 401 Greek I

3 UNITS An elementary study of Greek grammar for the translation and interpretation of the New Testament.

LS-G 502 Greek II

3 UNITS An elementary study of Greek grammar for the translation and interpretation of the New Testament.

LS-G 503 Greek III

1 UNIT An intermediate study of Greek grammar for the translation and interpretation of the New Testament.

LS-G 504 Greek IV

2 UNITS An intermediate study of Greek grammar for the translation and interpretation of the New Testament.

LS-H 501 Hebrew I

3 UNITS An elementary study of Hebrew grammar for the translation and interpretation of the Old Testament.

LS-H 502 Hebrew II

1 UNIT An elementary study of Hebrew grammar for the translation and interpretation of the Old Testament.

LS-H 503 Hebrew III

3 UNITS An intermediate study of Hebrew grammar for the translation and interpretation of the Old Testament.

LS-H 602 Hebrew IV

2 UNITS An intermediate study of Hebrew grammar for the translation and interpretation of the Old Testament.

New Testament

NT502 Gospels

3 UNITS This first course in the New Testament treats the genre, background, authorship, date, recipients, and contents of the four Gospels. It identifies the function of the Gospels within the New Testament and the entire canon of Scripture and introduces the student to Synoptic issues and the use of the Old Testament in the Gospels.

NT602 Acts and Pauline Epistles

3 UNITS Continuing study in the New Testament, this course treats the genre, background, authorship, date, recipients, and contents of Acts and the Pauline Epistles. It shows the relationship between the Gospel of Luke and Acts. It identifies the function of both Acts and the Pauline Epistles within the New Testament and the entire canon of Scripture and introduces the student to the use of the Old Testament in these books.

NT702 General Epistles and Revelation

MR. BARCELLOS 3 UNITS This final course in the New Testament treats genre, background, authorship, date, recipients, and the content of the General Epistles and Revelation. It identifies the function of both the general

Epistles and Revelation within the New Testament and the entire canon of Scripture and introduces the student to the use of the Old Testament in those books.

Old Testament

OT502 History and Wisdom

3 UNITS An introduction to the historical books and wisdom literature of the Old Testament within their literary and historical context. Emphasis will be placed upon the unfolding biblical theological story of Scripture. Additional emphasis will be placed upon the hermeneutical principles necessary for understanding and application of the text.

OT501 Pentateuch

3 UNITS An introduction to the foundational books for all biblical studies within the context of the Ancient Near Eastern background. Emphasis will be placed upon the biblical theological contribution of the Pentateuch as well as the hermeneutical principles necessary for understanding and application of the text.

OT602 Prophets

3 UNITS An introduction to the history, content, and biblical theological contribution of the Old Testament prophets. Emphasis will be placed upon a careful reading, exposition, and application of selected Hebrew texts from the prophetic corpus of the Old Testament.

Practical Theology

PT 500 Theology of Ministry

2 UNITS An introduction to the nature of the Christian ministry, the nature of the call to the ministry, and the requisite gifts and graces for the Christian minister. It also addresses the centrality of the ministry of the word, the biblical and Reformed doctrine of the regulative principle of worship, as well as a wide-range of subjects related to Pastoral Theology from a Reformed Baptist perspective.

PT602 Homiletics I - Preaching and Sermon Preparation

2 UNITS After a brief reminder of Dr. Renihan's description of preaching (PT500), this course will first examine the biblical method, content, and goal of preaching. This will be followed by a method of sermon preparation based upon the integration of sound hermeneutics, exegesis, theology, and Christ-centered application to different kinds of hearers. The expository method will be emphasized.

PT603 Preaching Practicum I

1 UNIT Students will prepare sermons which will be delivered in a worshipful context for the edification of one another (25-30 minutes taped). These sermons will be critiqued graciously and judiciously in class, followed by a more detailed critique in private by the professor. The purpose is to evaluate the presentations for the guidance of each student concerning his gifts and practice. Emphasis will be placed upon the integration of exegesis and the expository method for pastoral application.

PT604 Missions and Evangelism

2 UNITS The biblical foundations of missions and evangelism will be explored in this course. This includes the theology of missions in the Reformed faith, the question of contextualization in missions, the qualifications for a missionary (both local and international), the role of the local church in missions and evangelism, and the practical application of evangelism through the local church. This will also include an examination of the method of ARBCA and RBMS as a help to the local church to send and oversee its missionary(s).

PT605 Pastoral Theology I - Theological Pastoring

3 UNITS Building upon PT500, theological pastoring studies the preparation, identification, and work of the pastor/elder in the New Testament. Various topics of systematic theology will be integrated into a "whole counsel of God – sound doctrine" theology for pastoral thinking and practice, thus preparing the man of God to be "able to teach" and able to "rule." A part of this course is meant to help the student to understand that all pastoral work is theological, which enables the pastor to apply the Word of God accurately to each church and person.

PT606 Preaching Practicum II

MR. MALONE 1 UNIT Students will prepare sermons which will be delivered in a worshipful context for the edification of one another (25-30 minutes taped). These sermons will be critiqued graciously and judiciously in class, followed by a more detailed critique in private by the professor. The purpose is to evaluate the presentations for the guidance of each student concerning his gifts and practice. Greater attention to the integration of exegesis, theology and pastoral application will be emphasized.

PT706 Worship

MR. PULS 2 UNITS Reformed worship, theology, and practice will be examined in this intensive course. This will include a biblical-theological comparison of revealed worship in the Old Testament with the instituted worship of the New Covenant in the New Testament. Necessary topics will include the regulative principle of worship both in the Old Testament and New Testament, the proper elements of Christian worship defined biblically and confessionally, the role of God's Word and its proclamation in Christian worship, the consideration of proper music in worship, the proper forms and participants in Christian worship, and the ultimate goal of all Christian worship ... the glory of God. Modern schools of Christian worship will be considered in due course and evaluated in light of the regulative principle of worship.

PT701 Pastoral Administration

MR. PRODIGALIDAD 1 UNIT This course will prepare students to lead and care for God's people by highlighting the importance of managing God's household well. We will review principles of stewardship and see its practical outworking in church finances, asset management, mobilizing people and ministry opportunities. We will also see how effective communication builds church unity, encourages service and prepares God's people for seasons of change.

PT702 Pastoral Counseling

MR. DAVIDSON 2 UNITS A survey and introduction to the role of the pastor as a counselor of God's people using the Word of God. The course will survey theological, historical, and practical areas related to pastoral counseling and will focus on the use of the Scriptures in the counseling ministry of the church. Various topics will be addressed from a biblical perspective such as fear, depression, guilt, family, and habitual sin and will be surveyed alongside biblical anthropology, counseling methodology, and biblical solutions for addressing such issues.

PT703 Pastoral Theology II - Practical Theology

2 UNITS Having established the theology of pastoring in PTI, this course will examine its practical applications to areas of the pastoral ministry. This includes an overview of preaching, pastoral oversight, the proper administration of the sacraments, the practice of church discipline, the relationship between the Elders and Deacons in the local church, the proper protocol for moderating the meetings of the officers as well as the congregation, weddings, funerals, constitutions, church building use, and other practical matters which may arise. In all of these practical areas, the biblical pastoral decor will be variously applied.

PT704 Homiletics II – Preaching

2 UNITS Following the foundations of PT602, this course will further refine the expository, Christ-centered preaching which integrates theology and application to various kinds of hearers. Further topics will include an overview of the Law and the Gospel in pastoral preaching, preaching Christ in all the Scriptures, and forming long-range plans for preaching in the local church.

PT705 Puritan Preaching for Today

2 UNITS The Puritans modeled a theology and form of preaching which is worthy both of study and contextual emulation. Dr. Renihan's course on Puritanism (CH610) would be a helpful pre-requisite for this course. Examples of Puritan preaching from the past will be examined together with more contemporary followers of their theology and preaching theory (Bunyan, Spurgeon, Lloyd-Jones, etc.). Without copying the Puritans, it is hoped that the student will understand their core preaching theology and its application in order to integrate their lessons into his own gifts, personality, and practice.

Systematic Theology

ST500 Introduction to Ministerial and Theological Studies

2 UNITS This is a team-taught inter-disciplinary course covering topics such as the Christian life of theology students, intro to internship, library & theological bibliography, writing & grammar, etc. The English Bible Exam will be administered during this course. It will be required for all entering students.

ST501 Symbolics I

2 UNITS A detailed examination of the history, language, and theology of the London Baptist Confession of Faith of 1689 in order to understand its historical setting and its theological relevance to the present. Historical comparisons will be made to the Westminster and Savoy Confessions. Other Baptist confessions will be considered as they relate to this document.

ST502 Symbolics II

2 UNITS A detailed examination of the history, language, and theology of the London Baptist Confession of Faith of 1689 in order to understand its historical setting and its theological relevance to the present. Historical comparisons will be made to the Westminster and Savoy Confessions. Other Baptist confessions will be considered as they relate to this document.

ST601 Prolegomena and Doctrine of the Word

3 UNITS This course treats the nature and purpose of theology and the doctrine of Scripture from a confessionally Reformed perspective. Particular attention is devoted to the proper object, cognitive principles, and ends of theology, the epistemological basis for doing theology, and the unity of theology.

ST602 Doctrine of God

3 UNITS This course will consider the doctrine of God (theology proper) by examining God's existence and attributes, his triunity, and his acts of decree, creation, and providence. The contrast between classical Christian theism and its modern alternatives will be given special attention.

ST603 Theological Anthropology

2 UNITS This course will explore the biblical doctrine of man from a systematic perspective. It will include the study of God's creation of man, his constitutional nature, the image of God, the moral law of God written on his heart, the covenant of works, the fall, the doctrine of sin, and the nature of human freedom.

ST701 Christology

3 UNITS This course considers the person and work of Christ in the accomplishment of salvation, examining the scriptural basis and systematic development of the doctrine from the conciliar debates of the fifth century, its appropriation and codification within the Reformed tradition, and its modern and contemporary modifications.

ST702 Soteriology

3 UNITS This course examines the work of the Holy Spirit in the economy of salvation and the application of redemption. The doctrine of Soteriology is presented systematically, defended exegetically, explicated confessionally from within the Reformed Tradition, and contrasted critically with alternative views.

ST703 Doctrine of the Church

3 UNITS A study of biblical ecclesiology, covering such subjects as the nature, purpose, and centrality of the church, the structure and function of a church, the sacraments of the church, church discipline, associations, missions, and cooperative efforts.

ST704 Eschatology

2 UNITS This course presents a systematic account of Eschatology as it is both expressly set down and necessarily contained in the Holy Scripture. Alternative views are surveyed, and students will be taught to evaluate the biblical and confessional coherency, hermeneutical presuppositions, and theological implications of each of these views from a Reformed perspective.
